Yala (ยะถา)

Yala is the southernmost province of Thailand. Landlocked, Yala is bordered by Songkhla, Pattani, and Narathiwat to the north, and by the Malaysian states of Kedah and Perak to the south. While originally

dominated by the mining industry, Yala now relies on fruit crops. This province is one of four Thai provinces with a Muslim majority (75.5%), with smaller Buddhist and Christian populations.

Yala has an area of 4,427 square kilometers. With a 2011 population of 493,767, the population density is 110/km².
